Jerusalem Divrei Torah

The centrality of Jerusalem to the Jewish People is indisputable and is the core of our mission. The Beit ha-Mikdash -The Well of Torah

In our parsha the Jewish people are singing a song about the well of Miriam. While on basic level the Jews were praising Hashem for their miraculous water source, there are deeper explanations as well.

In general, we find at least two sets of associations with wells and water. First, water is a symbol of Torah as per the pasuk: "All who are thirsty should go to the water"[1] which the Gemara interprets as a reference to Torah study.[2] Second, a well in particular represents the Beit ha-Mikdash. In his commentary on the story of Yitzhak digging the three wells and his confrontations with the Pelishtim, the Ramban[3] notes that the story foreshadows the history of the Batei Mikdash.

The fact that the Torah and the Beit ha-Mikdash share a symbol fits with the inherent connection between the two. The Ramban explains that it is from the Beit ha-Mikdash that Torah, the word of Hashem, emanates. Torah, in its most pristine form can only come from the Sanhedrin that sits in the Beit ha-Mikdash and is privy to the unique divine spirit that exists there. The Beit ha-Mikdash is the well from which the living waters of Torah can flow.

It is for this reason that the destruction of the Beit ha-Mikdash is associated with a loss of Torah. Megilat Eicha mourns for the loss of Torah. [4] The Gemara identifies the exile of the Jewish people as the single biggest source of the diminishment of Torah study in world history. [5] In several places the Vilna Gaon elaborates on the qualitative and quantitative decrease in Torah learning that commenced with the destruction of the Beit ha-Mikdash. For example, at the end of each Shemonah Esreih we pray that "the Beit ha-Mikdash be rebuilt

speedily in our days and that He should grant us our portion in Torah." The Vilna Gaon explains that this indicates that there is an inextricable link between the return of the Beit ha-Mikdash and our ability to find our portion in the Torah. [6]

Perhaps it is for this reason that the well of Miriam is associated with the rebuilding of the third Beit ha-Mikdash. The prophet Zecharya foretells that in the end of days, "living water will emerge from Yerushalayim."[7] The Pirkei de-Rebbi Eliezer identifies the source of this water as the well of Miriam that will reappear and be situated in the Beit ha-Mikdash, from which the waters will flow. [8] From the Beit ha-Mikdash – the deepest well in the world – will the pure and fresh waters of Torah flow.

May we merit the rebuilding of the Beit ha-Mikdash and the return of the highest levels of Torah.


